


Welcome

We were asked by the province to choose 10 nominees to be awarded these medals from the library community. As a librarian early in my career it was a unique opportunity to get to see and learn from people across the library field who have had big impacts on libraries. These nominees came from all education levels and all types of libraries but the one thing that stood out was that they were nominated for and had huge impact not because of their 9-5 work but because of the volunteer contributions they made to the field outside of their work. 






















WHAT WE OFFER



We increased our open hours so we were open 2,244 hours this year.





Why Volunteer?



Party Time, Crabby! by Jonathan Fenske




Spring for adults

Judging a book by it's cover

We've all heard "you can't judge a book by it's cover" but generally that isn't always true. Publishers usually use similar covers and fonts for books within a genre like romance, mystery or fantasy because it makes it easier for readers to quickly find the books they like. We are also more likely to try a new book if it looks like a book we've already enjoyed or by a bigger name author. However, there are some big changes happening behind the publishing scenes that are making it hard for readers to judge a book by their cover. Behind the scenes here at the library even our staff is having trouble telling if a book is a kids or adult book, or a romance or mystery because of these changes.

If you're interested there's a couple reasons for these changes. First is the arrival of AI and vector art. This means publishers don't need to hire artists for their covers and so it's a lot cheaper to produce. This usually results in more cartoony images or background scenery covers. Some are skipping the images completely and making the title and author information bigger on a coloured background. Many of these covers look more like what we've seen from Teen and Junior novels or older women's fiction like the Shopaholic series. However don't be fooled many of these new books have the same spicy romance or grisly murders hiding behind their covers.

The second is a major shift in romance novel publishers changing from pocket paperback size to trade paperback size. The major reason for this is that publishers can sell the book for more money if it's in the larger size, However, if this is successful I suspect we will see it move through all genres in the years ahead. We've also seen a lot of variations on the pocket paperback sizing lately too.

All this is to say that maybe right now it might be harder to judge a book by it's cover and if you need some help finding new books any of our lovely staff would be happy to make some recommendations. Happy Reading!!
