Hello Sandra,

First of all, I would like to introduce myself. My name is Robyn Gray, and I am the new Director of Camrose Public Library. I am aware of your initial letter of complaint to Camrose Public Library, have seen our Board Chair Ms. Elizabeth Luck's response, and on March 26, 2019 received your letter to the Camrose County Council written on December 8, 2018. Camrose County Council expressed the wish that I reach out to you regarding your concerns.

Thank you for bringing forward your objection about one of the posters by artist Daniel Arzola. I would like to reaffirm what Ms. Luck sent in our first letter to you. I am sorry to hear that you feel our initial response disregarded your concerns; as an organization that upholds the right of everyone to have a voice, that was not our intention. As Ms. Luck stated, Camrose Public Library Board has carefully considered the library's collection development through its Acquisition Policy, which states the library's responsibility to meet the needs of our community, and that not all materials will be suitable to every patron. Camrose Public Library's current Plan of Service supports lifelong learning, including access to all forms of knowledge, as well as teaching visitors to think critically and to recognize bias. We developed this plan of service based on community needs assessments as well as the CFLA's Statement on Intellectual Freedom. As you wrote so aptly in your letter, "the library is a place that provides equitable access for all citizens to a variety of books and learning resources". According to the CFLA's Statement on Intellectual Freedom:

Libraries have a core responsibility to safeguard and facilitate access to constitutionally protected expressions of knowledge, imagination, ideas, and opinion, including those which some individuals and groups consider unconventional, unpopular or unacceptable. To this end, in accordance with their mandates and professional values and standards, libraries provide, defend and promote equitable access to the widest possible variety of expressive

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content and resist calls for censorship and the adoption of systems that deny or restrict access to resources.

If we enacted a policy of considering library materials based on "the dignity of sacred images, symbols of faith and spiritual artifacts from all religions in our community" we would be unable to have library materials that relate to any religion. This would eliminate a large chunk of our collection, both fiction and non-fiction, as well as some of our seasonal programming and displays. This would also impose limits on the space we allow community organizations to use; special interest groups could no longer rent our meeting rooms to share their ideas and opinions with peers and others who are interested in learning about another culture or religion. We cannot impose these limitations within the library and want to continue offering relevant services for all individuals in our community, as well as space for different voices to be heard; therefore, we will not be removing Daniel Arzola's artwork from our collection and it will remain on the library wall.



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Freshly Minted: Robyn Gray

April 8, 2019

Director, Camrose Public Library

Who are you and what do you do?

My name is Robyn Gray, and I am the Director of Camrose Public Library.

Camrose is a small but mighty city in Alberta, with about 27,200 citizens between the City of Camrose and Camrose County. A few of my tasks are to work with the Library Board to ensure our space meets the needs of citizens, develop positive working relationships with community groups and other public libraries, and manage our 25 staff. In addition to offering programs, resources, and services right at the library, we are always looking at ways to do new outreach and collaborations in the community.

What was it that initially drove you to librarianship?

I have always loved libraries, but never thought about it as a career path until the semester of my Bachelor of Arts degree.

I was trying to think of possible next steps, like a Master's in English or maybe Law School...but when I realized I could be a librarian, I instantly knew it was the perfect degree for me and I have never looked back. I wanted a career where I would be constantly learning and growing, and librarianship offers that variety of experience and endless possibilities.

Where did you complete your MLIS?

Dalhousie University, in Halifax. I loved my experience there!

When did you start your first professional librarian position?

I started at Northern Lights Library System in May of 2016 as a Public Services Consultant. I knew I was willing to move anywhere in Canada to begin getting experience as a librarian, so I happily moved to Elk Point, Alberta for the job!

How long did the job search take and how did you prepare yourself for it?

I started applying for jobs extremely early; in November of my last year of school I had already started sending out applications across Canada! But I didn't get any interviews until March 2016.

When Northern Lights Library System asked me to deliver a presentation as part of the interview, I prepared a 'handout' to send ahead of time, guided them through a PowerPoint presentation, and I had spent a great deal of time perusing their website and social media before the interview. This showed them that I was willing to go the extra mile to get the job, and in the end I was able to start right after I graduated.

How did you do your job search? What were some of the things that worked and didn't? What was the greatest challenge?

I monitored job sites regularly, such as the University of Toronto Faculty of Information Jobsite, the Jerome listserv, the Foothills Library Association jobsite, and the Partnership Job Board. I had a lot of generous mentors who agreed to read over my cover letter, resume, and curriculum vitae, and I soaked up any advice I could from them. I customized every cover letter and would also make alterations to the resume depending on which job I was applying for. The biggest challenge was probably deciding when I shouldn't apply for particular jobs. I wanted to apply for anything and everything, but applying to too many things meant that the quality of each cover letter would suffer as I didn't have the time to customize each one. Sometimes you have to be honest with yourself and realize that certain jobs aren't worth your time based on your knowledge of your own priorities.

Is your work as a professional what you expected and prepared yourself for while you were in the MLIS program? Otherwise, what would you have done differently if you knew?

I'm very grateful that I took a management course in my MLIS program (it was required) as my job now is a full-on manager! I don't think I had expected that at all during my MLIS, but I also had kept an open mind throughout the degree. I'm grateful that I took a wide variety of courses during my MLIS (including law librarianship and information literacy) as I can bring a wide background of information into everything that I do.

I don't think I would do anything differently; no matter what job you take on, you will need to learn new things regardless of what you learned in school. I also took on a wide variety of part-time jobs and volunteer roles while at school, and that played a huge part in rounding out my experience that I could speak to in job interviews.

How do you stay current in your field?

I'm always staying aware of new trends by following a variety of libraries on social media and staying in touch with other library professionals within my region. I love to hear about all sorts of ideas, and then I can establish whether they are ideas we could apply here in Camrose!

What do you think is the most important aspect of being an information professional today?

Adaptability (to new technologies, new duties on the job, and potential changes in circumstances), the ability to educate others about the dangers of Fake News, and the willingness to embrace that libraries have changed so much since their initial inception. A library can be so much more than a warehouse for books, and there are so many ways you can let others in your community know that!

Any advice for the many MLIS students who will be soon graduating and loc for their first professional position?

Don't be afraid to network. Kindly ask professionals to meet for coffee and share their knowledge with you. Some connections won't go beyond an initial discussion, but others may turn into lifelong friendships. Don't network with others if you're hoping to get a job out of them (which is a major turn-off!), but rather network for the sake of the actual discussion. Another note in regards to networking: if you are a bit of an introvert (like me) and are attending a conference or library event, set reasonable goals for how much networking you will do – instead of getting intimidated by being around a ton of people, try to talk to two new people each day of a conference.

Get involved in library executives and volunteer opportunities if you can – you never know what valuable skills you'll learn from each new experience.

Also, you can never be too prepared for a job interview. Go through the job description point by point, thinking of all your experiences that relate to each qualification the posting is looking for.

Don't be afraid to bring forward a wide range of examples from your background that show the variety of experience you have to offer.

And let your enthusiasm shine through! Sometimes, it's less about how much you know and more about confidence, and how eager and ready you are to learn. A lot of the jobs I didn't get were because deep-down I thought they were too advanced for me, and that showed in the form of hesitation in the interview. Set aside some time to really peruse the workplace's website and social media – it's a step that shows how eager you are and how willing you are to get the job done. Best of luck to all of you!

We have once again applied for a number of summer grant positions and are awaiting the results of most of those, but are happy to say we have been approved for our STEP grant. We have filled all of the positions with energetic and outgoing candidates that we think will be a great fit:

Circulation Assistant

13 people applied for the latest Circulation Assistant position (which is impressive considering the limited number of hours being promoted in the job ad) – many of the candidates were extremely qualified! We are happy to say we hired Debbie Schielke, for whom we received several recommendations (including her reference from Augustana library who said that she was an excellent public services assistant), and we were very impressed with her prioritization of customer service.

Online System Transition

We are slowly adapting to Polaris, although certain aspects are proving to be less user-friendly than others. For example, staff are not finding the search tool as easy to use as it had been with Horizon; but alternatively we love that check-out receipts now show the amount of money a patron has saved by using the library! Staff are still adjusting to using Polaris, but slowly all of our questions are getting answered and we are able to use the system for day-to-day operations. I am so grateful for how efficiently staff made the transition to this new system! I wanted to note that March was Polaris Migration Month, which means that circulation stats may have been a bit

lower than usual. Also, eContent circulation stats were unavailable at the time this report was generated, because Parkland is still figuring out how to generate them with Polaris.

New Lights

Paul Stone from the City of Camrose has let us know that we will soon be replacing all of our fluorescent lighting with LED bulbs, beginning over Easter weekend.

Pride Symposium and Cabaret

On March 23, Nicole attended the Augustana Queers and Allies Fostering Allyship Symposium, representing the library and selling pride socks between sessions. Both Nicole and I (informally) attended the Cabaret and Family Dance that followed; this was a fundraiser as well as a farewell event for Carol Brietkreutz, who has played an influential role in the Camrose Pride Community and has since moved to Montreal in her retirement. We enjoyed performances by About Time Productions as well as Garry Williams, who is a musical theatre writer and LGBTQ advocate in Halifax and had been the keynote at the symposium.

Political Candidate Forum

On April 1st, the library hosted a Candidate Forum for the MLA candidates for Camrose. Five of the seven candidates were able to join us to speak and answer questions: Morgan Bamford of the New Democratic Party, Kevin Smook of the Alberta Party, Wes Caldwell of the Freedom Conservative Party, Sandra Kim of the Alberta Advantage Party, and Bonnie Tanton, Independent. Shannon and Kelly did all of the groundwork for this event, and I was the moderator – it was a terrific chance for more people to get to know me as the Director and I had a chance to speak with several people after the formal part of the evening was complete. It was also CPL's first time going live on Facebook!

Other Community Connecting

I was provided with a tour of Camrose Women's Shelter by their Executive Director, and am eager for us to continue our partnership and look for new ways that the library can support the shelter. I also attended my first Camrose County Council Meeting on April 9th, starting off with a brief introduction of myself as the new Director of CPL.

In the News

The article which I attached, called "Freshly Minted: Robyn Gray" on Librarianship.ca, has been shared on Facebook by at least 6 people/organizations, including Dalhousie University School of Information Management, Northern Lights Library System, and the Alberta Library Trustees' Association. In addition to this, I was featured in the Camrose Booster for the April 9th issue, and was interviewed by CFCW on April 10th.

Upcoming Events and Programs

We have been offering Virtual Reality with the Oculus Rift starting April 11 and ending April 17, which has drawn lots of attention! April is Earth Month at CPL (in honour of Earth Day – we couldn't squish all our events into one day) so coming up we have "Living Sustainably with Solar" on April 17, and "Basic Bike Repair" on April 23. We also have begun hosting an Open Craft Studio on the first Friday of each month, where people can come and bring their projects to work on and enjoy coffee and conversation at the library.

Parkland Representative

My most recent meeting on the Executive Committee for Parkland consisted primarily of reviewing Parkland's audit and proposed upcoming budget for 2020.

ADULT PROGRAMMER BOARD REPORT APRIL 2019

Special Events:

Body Image: A Course for Adults: We hosted a therapist from Canadian Mental Health to run a four week group around body image. We had steady numbers despite the cold weather and it showed patrons have an interest in health and wellness programs from a reliable source.

Cannabis Panels: The library hosted three different cannabis panels in January. We partnered with Service Options for Seniors for one just for seniors.

Little Yellow House: Finding Community in our Changing Neighbourhoods: We partnered with the Family Violence Action Society Service Options for Seniors and brought in Carissa Halton, the author of Little Yellow House. She is a great speaker and strong library advocate. Her book is a great read!

Célébration de la francaphonie: Robyn and I set up a display at Augustana for the celebration. Over 100 people attended!

Provincial Candidate Forum: The library hosted five of the seven candidates for a civil, polite and engaging question and answer session. We tried Facebook live for the first time **Other programs:** Winter Walking Safety (and Nordic Walking Poles!), Introduction to Acupuncture, DIY Green Cleaning and Nordlys 101.

Upcoming Events:

April is Earth Month: All month we are offering environmental programs. Basic Bike Repair, DIY recycled book crafts and Living Sustainably with Solar are all upcoming. **Seniors Week:** The first week of June is Seniors week and I am creating a week of Seniorspecific programs. Seniors Coalition is hosting a Seniors Expo June 7 to cap off the week.



Ongoing Programs:

Multiple Sclerosis Social: A new monthly program we are trying out on request of patrons. The MS Society is no longer connected to a group in Camrose, yet people still wanted an opportunity to meet and support one another – and I am thrilled to work with them.

Open Craft Studio: We are following patron demand for a chance for people to come in and craft together, but bring their own personal projects. It's exactly what our Plan of Service goal of developing relationships and ending isolation is all about. **Other ongoing programs:** Card making, Spanish speaking circle, French speaking circle, Meditation, Yarns, Got ukulele? and Book lovers discussion groups are all going strong.

And More:

Community Connection: I represent the library at Seniors Coalition and the Social Development Committee. I'm glad that the library can be at the table for these committees and I hope that we can strengthen our community partnerships this way. I'm also the staff liaison for the Fellowship of Camrose Public Library.

Robyn and I attended the last interagency meeting together, as well as a speaker the Chamber of Commerce brought in.

I attended a marketing workshop in Wetaskiwin that was immensely helpful. It said that traditional marketing and advertising doesn't work anymore, and it's all about how you need to build customer and community relationships before people will use your services. The library already makes community connection a priority, so it was good to know we are on the right track.

Alberta Library Conference (ALC): I am part of the ALC planning committee and am in charge of all publications. It's been rewarding to be part of a great event and contribute my skills where I can. It also means free conference registration! **Graphic Design:** The new logo has been rolled out and I have been creating graphics for all of our marketing needs. New posters, business cards, buttons, bookmarks and brochures have all been created and have a fresh, new look. You will notice Staff Pick stickers on library materials now, giving staff the chance to share our favourites with everyone.

CSL Student: Our CSL tech. student that we are supervising this semester, Alvee, is currently working on digitizing CPL's old noteworthy records, pictures, newspaper clippings, and other paraphernalia. This will allow us to keep these mementos in a safe digitized space that will be easy to access.

Dungeons and Dragons Club: Our RPG club continues to be popular with tweens and teens. They are currently in the midst of playing a game that one of the teens created by himself...and it's way too complicated for me, and I have no idea what's happening! ;)





Orientation of Board and Staff

Purpose

The Camrose Public Library Board recognizes the importance of having informed Board Members. To ensure this, the Board provides, within budget limitations, a comprehensive orientation program for all new Board Members.

The Library Director conducts an orientation with new Board Members to provide an overview of the Camrose Public Library services, trustee roles and responsibilities, provincial library legislation, and the framework for the provision of library services within the province of Alberta.

At the orientation session, new Board Members will receive a copy of relevant documents, and will be provided with a tour of CPL.

New Board Members are encouraged to attend a Board Basics Workshop facilitated by the provincial Public Library Services Branch. Board Members who have attended the workshop previously are encouraged to participate regularly to refresh their knowledge.

Camrose Public Library maintains a membership in the provincial trustees association.

For information about continuing education, please read the policy on Professional Development.

Camrose Public Library Bylaws

Bylaws

The Camrose Public Library Board enacts the following by-laws pursuant to The Libraries Act, R.S.A. 2000, Chapter L-11, Section 36.

1.0 Definition

- 1.1 For the purposes of this bylaw the expression:
 - 1. "Act" refers to The Libraries Act, R.S.A. 2000, Chapter L-11 and amendments thereto.
 - 2. "Board" refers to the Camrose Public Library Board.
 - 3. "Borrower" refers to the person to whom a Library borrower card has been issued.
 - 4. "CPL" refers to the Camrose Public Library.
 - 5. "Director" refers to the person charged by the Board with the operation of CPL.
 - 6. "Library Materials" has the widest possible meaning and encompasses -: regardless of format_-; items that are held in the collection of the Camrose Public Library or borrowed by the Camrose Public Library, <u>Thisand</u> includes books, periodicals, audio, video, or projected media, paintings, drawings, photographs, micromaterials, toys, games, kits, and electronic databases.
 - 7. "Library Resources" includes time, services, space, furniture, information, programs, equipment, and library materials designated for public use.
 - 8. "Hours of Operation" means the hours as set from time to time by the Board, that the Library is open to members of the public for the purpose of using or borrowing library materials.
 - 9. "Loan Period" means the period of time that a member may borrow Library resources for and includes any renewal of an original loan period.
 - 10. "PRL" meanst the Parkland Regional Library
 - 11. "TAL" means The Alberta Library

1.2 For the purposes of this bylaw:

- 1. Words imparting male persons include all persons.
- 2. Words in the singular include the plural and words in the plural include the singular.
- 3. Where a word is defined, other parts of speech and tenses of that word have corresponding meanings.
- 4. Where the time limit for doing anything falls on a day when the library is closed to the public, the time shall be deemed to be extended to the first day thereafter on which the library is open to the public.
- The Board, may, from time to time, change the specifics set out in the accompanying Schedules.

2.0 Use of Library Resources on the Library Premises

2.1.1 Any member of the general public can use any library resource on library premises.

3.0 Library Facility

3.1 The portion of any building used for public library purposes is open to any member of the public free of charge during the public hours of opening as set out by the CPL Board in library policies.

3.2 The Library's program room is available for use by groups in accordance with the terms and conditions outlined in Schedule A.

3.3 Every person using the Library building shall conduct himself so as to not disturb other Library users or damage any property.

Any staff member may ask any patron contravening this section to leave the premises. If any patron is asked and refuses to leave, the police may be contacted.

4.0 Borrower's Card

4.1 Any person may, in accordance with *subsection 4.2*, apply for a borrower's card from the Library.

-

4.2 An application for a borrower's card must be:

a) In a form determined by the Director

b) If the applicant is less than 14 years old, a parent or guardian (guarantor) of the applicant must be in attendance or give written permission.

c) Accompanied by the fee set out in Schedule B

4.3 A staff member may issue a borrower's card to a person who has satisfied the requirements set out in *subsection 4.2*

4.4 A borrower's card is valid for one year from the date of issue and may be renewed on payment of the applicable fee set out in *Schedule B*. For residents of the City of Camrose, whose library cards are free of charge, said cards can be renewed for an indefinite length of time.

4.5 Despite *subsection 4.3*, a borrower's card belongs to the Library and must be immediately returned to the Library if the holder of a borrower's card is requested to do so by the Director pursuant to *Section 7.3*

5.0 Responsibilities of a Borrower

5.1 A borrower card may only be used by the person to whom it is issued.

5.2 A borrower or guarantor shall be responsible for all library materials borrowed with the card; therefore, it is important that the borrower inform the Library if their card is lost or stolen.

5.3 A borrower or guarantor shall notify the Library of any change of address and/or telephone number.

5.4 A borrower or guarantor should return any Library item to the Library on or before the due date as provided in *Schedule C*.

6.0 Loan of Materials

6.1 In accordance with The Libraries Act, Section 36(3), there shall be no charge for the use of the following library resources:

a) Library resources used on the premises of the Library,

b) Library resources loaned to a borrower, and

c) Library resources acquired from other sources at the discretion of the Board.

6.2 For inter-library loan materials, when a lending library levies a charge for the loan or photocopy of materials, the requesting borrower may be asked to bear this charge.

6.3 Loan Periods are set by Parkland Regional Library

6.4 Library materials may be reserved in accordance with policy established by Parkland Regional Library.

6.5 Library materials may be renewed in accordance with policy established by Parkland Regional Library.

7.0 Penalty Provisions

7.1 The charges for late return of materials are set out in Schedule D.

7.2 The charges for damaged or lost materials are as set out in Schedule D.

7.3 A borrower card may be suspended or revoked by Library staff if the borrower:

a) fails to conduct himself in a manner so as not to disturb other Library customers,

b) fails to comply with the conditions set out in *section 4*,

c) fails to pay overdue fines within a time specified by the Director,

d) fails to pay an amount assessed by the Director for the loss or damage of a library resource within the time specified by the Director, or

e) exceeds the maximum allowable fine limit as set by Parkland Regional Library.

7.4 A person who has had their borrower card revoked pursuant to *subsection 7.3* may, within 30 days of such revocation, appeal to the Board in writing, setting out the grounds of the appeal.

7.5 The decision of the Board under *subsection 7.4* is final

7.6 In cases of serious dereliction, the Board may prosecute an offence under The Libraries Act, Section 41. Such an offence is punishable under The Libraries Act, Section 41. The range of penalties applying on conviction for such an offence is set out in *Schedule D*.

7.7 Any charge or penalty imposed pursuant to an offence under The Libraries Act inures to the benefit of CPL in accordance with The Libraries Act, Section 42.

8.0 Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy (FOIP) Bylaw

8.1 The purpose of this bylaw is to establish the administrative structure of the Camrose Public Library in relation to the freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act and to set fees thereunder.

8.2 The Director of Library Services shall be responsible and accountable for all decisions taken under the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act.

8.3 Where an Applicant is required to pay a fee for services, the fee payable is in accordance with the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Regulation, AR 200195, as amended from time to time or any successor Regulation that sets fees for requests for information from the Policy.

This bylaw replaces the previous CPL Bylaws.

1. 3. At any time, the municipalities may cover the cost of library cards, making them free +to those who reside in that municipality.

4. Residents of a municipality that is a member of Parkland Regional Library System will + 1. be charged for and issued a borrower card for their home library. The home library is determined by the geographic location where property taxes are paid.

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1. <u>5.</u> Residents of a municipality that is *not* a member of Parkland Regional Library System will be charged \$30.00 per household.

1. 6. The Alberta Library (TAL) Card Holders:

Individuals who present valid TAL cards from their home library are eligible to have a CPL barcode attached to their home library card and to borrow CPL materials as per the TAL regulations. There will be no charge or fee for this service.

1. ME Card

The ME card allows patrons to use their local card at other public libraries across Alberta to borrow their materials. Adults ages 18 and over in good standing may complete a web form to create accounts with other libraries. They must follow the rules of the lending library. ME materials may be returned at any library in Alberta.

Library materials borrowed from any other library whether within the Parkland Regional Library system, TAL, or ME are set to the owning library's borrowing period and may be different than what Camrose Public Library's borrowing periods are. Patrons are responsible for knowing when their library items are due regardless of which library the item is from and Camrose Public Library will make every effort to communicate various loan periods to patrons.

Schedule D: Penalty Provisions

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1. Late return charges per item

a) For all materials, the late return charge will be \$.25 per item per day to a limit set by Parkland Regional Library.

b) Grace of one business day will be allowed for all materials before late charges commence. No charges will accumulate on any day the Library is closed.

c) An item is considered "returned" when it is checked in by Library staff. Items left in the "After Hours Return Box" will be checked in by staff on the next business day.

1. <u>2.</u> Charges for damaged or lost resources:

a) For Library materials lost or damaged beyond repair, borrowers will pay the publisher's list price on the item. Where publisher's list price is not available, it will be assumed to be as follows:

Trade paperback	\$20.00
Mass market paperback	\$10.00
Periodicals	\$8.00
CDs	\$20.00
Books on CD	\$30.00
DVDs or Blu-Rays	

b) For resources other than materials listed above, borrowers will pay replacement cost for loss or damage.

c) Patron accounts will be suspended if late, lost, or damaged resources reach a value set by Parkland Regional Library.

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Hours of Use

The Camrose Public Library Board shall set hours of service to encourage library use by all residents of the community.

It is the policy of the Board to ensure that the library hours are consistent with the Alberta Libraries Act and Regulations, Alta. Reg. 141/98, section 7 (2)(f) which requires regularly scheduled public hours of operation.

The Director may authorize that the library be closed on Statutory Holidays or on days when there is a power and/or equipment failure, extreme weather conditions, or a community event. As soon as it is determined that the library will be closed, the closed days must be posted to inform the public.
