Dear Mr. Kurek,

I am writing to ask that you urge the federal government to immediately restore full funding to the Centre for Equitable Library Access (CELA) and the National Network for Equitable Library Service (NNELS). CELA and NNELS provide necessary reading materials for people with print disabilities including those with vision loss, learning disabilities and physical disabilities.

Without warning or consultation, the 2020 Fall Economic Statement announced cuts of \$4 million (\$3 million annually to CELA and \$1 million annually to NNELS) which will have a devastating impact on their ability to produce and distribute accessible reading materials. We know that access to reading materials directly impacts peoples' academic achievement, economic success, and social inclusion, particularly for the estimated 3 million people across Canada with print disabilities. We also know that without access to reading material and the personal independence and social connectedness that it can foster, people are less likely to be engaged with community, which can be detrimental to having a strong sense of civic responsibility.

The federal government has promoted its commitment to equity and inclusion for those with disabilities. However, these cuts will reduce access to reading materials, widening the gap for services and resources, and further compounding the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, which is having a disproportionate impact on those with disabilities across Canada.

It is essential that this funding be fully restored immediately. On behalf of Camrose Public Library and our patrons, we request that you ask the Minister of Employment, Workforce Development and Disability Inclusion, the Hon. Carla

Qualtrough, and the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance, the Hon. Chrystia Freeland, to restore this funding and commit to ongoing, stable funding so those with reading disabilities across Canada are not left further behind.

# Highlights of the Parkland Regional Library Board Meeting FEBRUARY 25, 2021

#### Parkland Annual Report

Despite the many challenges of 2020, with service interruptions and library closures caused by the pandemic, some service highlights are worth mentioning:

- Cardholders system wide are at 31,771
- The total collection in the system catalogue is 680.384
- While total system circulation was down from 2019's 1,312,278, it was still surprisingly high in 2020 at 912,147. This includes 129,254 eBook and eAudiobook circulations
- IT visits, virtual and in person, remained consistent; 2,464 in 2019 and 2,499 in 2020.
- Library consulting visits went up massively. In 2019, consultants made 143 virtual and inperson visits to libraries, while in 2020, there were 472! The vast were virtual
- Parkland consulting staff hosted over 30 virtual meetings with 296 attendees
- Virtual visits to Parkland's website and catalogue were also up slightly to 214,874 from 198,893 in 2019
- Database use increased significantly from 58,486 in 2019 to 79,529 in 2020

Despite being a difficult year, Parkland and public libraries rose to the many challenges they faced. Unlike many other organizations and services that shut down entirely, public libraries adapted and strove to continue answering their communities' need with vital services.

The annual report to members will be forthcoming.

#### **Executive Committee Seat**

Jason Alderson, the representative from zone #4, has resigned and is leaving the province. This has created a vacancy on Parkland's Executive Committee that needed to be filled. Len Phillips, representing the Town of Rocky Mtn. House, volunteered to sit on the Executive Committee at the February Board Meeting. Welcome Len!

#### PRLS Strategic Plan

Parkland's current strategic plan (plan of service) runs through the years 2019 – 2021. Were Parkland to have a new strategic plan produced for 2022 – 2024, 2021 would be the needs assessment and plan development year.

Given the highly irregular nature of library service at present, it is unlikely that a needs assessment undertaken in 2021 would yield accurate information for the upcoming years. What libraries need now is very different from what they will likely need after the pandemic. The board discussed the four goals in the current strategic plan and agreed that they are still relevant. It was also decided to extend Parkland's current strategic plan for one more year, through 2022.

#### **Advocacy Committee Report**

The Advocacy Committee has met twice since the last board meeting in November. The focus of these meetings has been to establish priorities for 2021. These include:

- 1. Continue to educate Parkland's board members and develop advocates on our board.
- 2. Help library boards to advocate for themselves at their local level.
- 3. Increase System awareness to member library boards.

In December, the committee began working collaboratively with Yellowhead Regional Library (YRL) on advocacy related tools. This collaboration has been very successful, so much so that YRL will be cooperating in its advocacy efforts with Parkland for the foreseeable future.

Advocacy members also introduced a virtual tour of the new Parkland building which is available to view on our website here.

#### Stronger Together 2021

Parkland will be collaborating once again with the Alberta Library, (TAL) the Peace Library System, (PLS) and Yellowhead Regional Library, (YRL) to offer a free virtual conference. *Stronger Together* will be held from September 22-24, 2021. More information will be forthcoming.

The cover page of the board meeting package included three questions for the board to consider. Responses to the questions were encouraged during the Parkland Community update.

- Moved into a new building after 60 years

- Libraries learned to adapt!
- Libraries supported and shared the new innovative ways member libraries continued to operate.




## Makerspace, 3D Printer, and STEAM kits; oh my!:

## A Book and A Bounce:





In the last week of February every year, libraries across Canada celebrate our Charter rights to freedom of expression and access to information. My first FTRW at this library I hosted an adult story time where I read Adam Mansbach's *Go The F\*\*k to Sleep*. This year I revisited the theme with *Sweary Stories*: a virtual story time for the 18+ crowd. 10 people joined me vis Zoom for uncensored selections from Adam Mansbach and David Sedaris, followed by a discussion of our own personal favourite sweary stories.

Camrose Pride Week runs from March 8-12, so I created some Grab-and-Go DIY Rainbow Book Bands in partnership with Camrose Pride Community for the occasion. I'll run the Pride flag up our flagpole on the morning of March 8.



### **Open Door Association outreach:**

I contacted Paige Mitchell, Housing Supervisor at the Open Door, to see if they could use some craft kits for residents of the Camrose emergency and transitional housing facilities. Queer youth are exponentially more likely to become homeless than their cisgender or heterosexual peers, so I thought it fitting to provide them with some of the Rainbow Book Band kits I created for Pride Week.

# ADULT PROGRAMMER BOARD REPORT APRIL 2021

Makerspace: Nicole and I have been working hard to transform the program room into a new and exciting makerspace. I created a marketing campaign that includes new posters in the children's area, branded bookmarks and brochures and even buttons to help spread the word. The bright colours have updated the children's area and given it a breath of fresh air. Upon reopening, it will give the library programming flexibility by allowing patrons to choose what they would like to work with vs. us running a specific program. All grab and go crafts we will make while we are closed will be branded with the makerspace logos and will all be connected to activities you could do in the makerspace once we open again.

**Dementia Grant:** Most of the materials for the kits have been ordered and are being processed as we speak. Part of the kits that the library will loan out will be a handmade crocheted fidget balls that volunteers are being recruited to make. The patron can keep the ball and return the rest of the kit. We have hired Lindsay Ault as the intergenerational programmer for the summer and look forward to making plans for the dementia programs she can offer this summer.

**Mind Masters:** A monthly 8-page game booklet that is senior-friendly with lots of white space and appropriate topics. Camrose Meals on Wheels clients look forward to its delivery, as well as 7 direct mail-outs.


**Book Club:** We have been using CPL book club kits and hosting a meeting over zoom. (Just an aside – I can't wait for the library to open to programming again so we can talk books **in person!)** February's title was Miss Benson's Beetle, March was Belonging and April's title is Circe by Madeline Miller.

**Subject Matters:** Booklets and craft kits continue to be popular, even when we are closed. The theme for May is walking and I have created a walking journal for adults and a scavenger hunt activity for children. It's been an interesting program to run because it's been flexible and adaptable despite being open or closed.

One on One Tech Tutoring: With no technology programmer any longer, Nicole and I have each been taking one day a week for technology appointments (until, of course, we closed again). It was difficult to assist people and still keep the 6' distance, but we were able to use the projector and screen to help. We have quickly realized how important this service is and the gap it fills for the community.


















Puzzles: 17 puzzles are now part of the super-popular puzzle collection. The library initially purchased 4 and the rest have been donated. Donations are continuing to come in!

**Donations for the community**: December's theme for Subject Matters was Cosy, and we had a donation project attached to it - Kind Deeds, Cosy Hearts. Pj's, mitts, socks and hats were collected for the Camrose Women's Shelter (2 big boxes full!)

Craft Kits: Last fall I created 8 craft kits full of donated stamping and cardmaking supplies. Patrons can check out the kits and return the stamps and ink, but keep the paper we include. Several pieces of paper are restocked and the kits can circulate again.

I just finished 6 more kits that are all fibre arts - like knitting, weaving and needle felting. We have a large stock of donated yarn, so we can refill each kit with some yarn before it goes out again. The kits, like the puzzles and the game booklet, have been a way to engage patrons in a different way when we can't meet them in-person for a program.



Outreach: We have been working on streamlining our outreach program to care facilities in Camrose. There is a new brochure and poster (left) as well as a new and improved intake form. Through this program we are striving to make a deeper connection to our patrons who are isolated. Making monthly calls and checking in on patrons will help decrease the isolation many are feeling right now.

All outreach clients also get a Mind Masters games booklet with their delivery now as well.

Community: I am part of the City of Camrose Social Development Committee and the Camrose Seniors Coalition. Both are important groups that bring forward new opportunities for community engagement and programming.

Advertising and Marketing: While the library has a social media following, we know that we are not reaching all our patrons (or potential patrons). I have been submitting a monthly library update in the CDSS Interagency Newsletter. I have also created advertising for the Camrose Booster and Morning News in order to let the community know what we are up to. With sudden openings and closings, it has been important to keep the community engaged with us in as many ways as possible. I create a monthly program calendar for patrons as well as create brochures for our different services, including outreach, volunteers, makerspace and a general welcome brochure. I also make posters weekly for the curbside pickup window and for social media to highlight what patrons can grab and go with each week. I have been working hard to create a consistent, recognizable brand for the library.
