Dear City of Camrose Library Board,

I am writing to you because of a Liberal Party platform promise that may have significant implications for your organization.

In their 2021 platform, the Liberal Party promised to "No longer provide charity status to antiabortion organizations (for example, Crisis Pregnancy Centres) that provide dishonest counselling to women about their rights and about the options available to them at all stages of the pregnancy" (pg. 4).

Now that the Liberal Party has formed government once again, I anticipate they will move forward with this campaign commitment. While this platform promise targets the abortion debate, it sets a dangerous precedent.


If an organization does not agree with the government in power, it should not be discriminated against. Charitable status should be determined by the benefit of the organization to the community it serves, not a values test based on partisan beliefs.

The charitable status of a broad range of organizations could now be under threat, regardless of whether pro-life work is part of the primary mission of those organizations. Implicated organizations include houses of worship and faith-based or culturally based hospitals, social welfare organizations, and schools.

In 2017, the federal government updated the requirements for organizations to receive funding for hiring summer students by including an attestation that obligated organizations to affirm their support for the right of individuals to access abortion. If the group in question refused to check the box, they were not considered to receive funding.

This values test led many organizations and communities to become ineligible to receive funds to hire summer students. The federal government changed course the following year, but only after significant public outcry.









To start the process of public awareness and mobilization, my office is organizing a petition campaign, to put pressure on the government and at the same time to raise public awareness. The petition calls on Parliament and the Government of Canada:

- 1. To protect and preserve the application of charitable status rules on a politically and ideologically neutral basis, without discrimination on the basis of political or religious values and without the imposition of another "values test" and,
- 2. To affirm the right of Canadian citizens to freedom of expression.

I hope that my letter has alerted you to the implications of the Liberal Party's platform and why it may impact your organization. In order to address this issue in Parliament and to try and bring about a change in the government's promised plan, please sign this petition and distribute it to people in your community and the members of your organization who may be concerned. Please feel free to scan or photocopy the petition and distribute it.

All signed petitions may be mailed to my office—postage and envelopes are not necessary. Simply sign the petition, fold it ensuring my address is visible and put it in the mail.

Thank you for your time and consideration of this important matter.

Director's Report January 22 2022

Staff Training Day

The library closed on Monday November 15 for our annual professional development day. In the first half of the day, Action for Healthy Communities came in to do cultural awareness training. Action for Healthy Communities is

"...a member of the Alberta Association of Immigrant Serving Agencies (<u>AAISA</u>) and works in a spirit of community development and partnership with numerous agencies and organizations in Alberta."

They have an office in Camrose, and were able to give us a better sense of the work they do, and how we can provide better service to newcomers in Camrose, including refugees, permanent residents, and immigrants.

In the second half of the day, we were able to watch sessions from the Stronger Together Conference that took place in September. Staff watched:

Your Password is **** a talk by Stephanie Thero from Yellowhead Regional Library "Cybersecurity is one of the leading concerns affecting organizations, but it isn't just a technology issue – it's a people issue.

Regardless of where you work, if you're connected, you're affected. Learn about the top three risks affecting users and leave armed with simple things you can do to improve your personal cybersecurity, including one that may just change your life."

New Children's Books for Fall 2021 a talk by Keitha Langston from United Library Services "A booktalk featuring great new books for public libraries, focusing on children's and teen books. Canadian authors will also be talking about their new books."

Keynote Address: Infodemic! Is Misinformation Killing Us? A talk by Professor Timothy Caulfield from the University of Alberta

"Cow urine, bleach, and cocaine have all been recommended as COVID-19 cures — all nonsense. The pandemic has been cast as a leaked bioweapon, a by-product of 5G wireless technology, and a political hoax — all poppycock. Throughout the year, they give readers' advisory presentations to libraries across the country highlighting their top picks and hidden gems of the latest new and upcoming releases."

Culture Days

The Camrose Culture Days celebration made the top ten list for Communities with the Most Events in 2021, in the Rural & Small Towns section. We tied for 9th place with Vernon, BC. We look forward to next year, where hopefully we can climb even higher on the list.

Janitorial Staff

Andy and Ruza Plancak retired after 23 years with CPL. We will miss their friendly faces, and thank them for their years of excellent service. We wish them the best in their retirement, and hope to see them come back and visit..

The decision to fill this roll with a contractor was made, and a temporary contract was put in place while the city helped us to create a Request for Proposals. The search is underway, and new contract is expected to begin January 31.

Early Chapter Books

In an attempt to make our collection easier to navigate for the public, we have now created a new section in the children's stacks. Early Chapter Books will now fall between our Beginner Readers and our Juvenile Fiction. Before, our Early Chapter Books were not marked in any specific manner, and were mixed throughout our Juvenile Fiction, meaning that a book that is intended to be a child's very first chapter book could be sitting right next to Anne of Green Gables. This made it difficult for children who are just starting their reading journey to find books that fit their needs, and also made it difficult for guardians to quickly find books that were relevant for their children.

CIDC Dementia Grant

We have concluded the Dementia Project as of the end of December 2021. Please see the attached evaluation for more details.



Stat Collection

CPL will be changing how we collect stats, in the hopes of getting more specific, and more accurate information. Foot traffic through the library will now be collected every day, allowing us to better track when the library sees the most usage. We will also be conducting three stat weeks throughout the year, where we log every interaction we have with the public, and where we conduct an hourly space usage study. We ran a test week during the first week of December to find the gaps in the methodology. Changes have been made, and the 2022 stat weeks will fall in March, July and November. While this means we are collecting data fewer times a year, we are now collecting more specific data. Doing this three times a year instead of expecting staff to log every interaction they ever have will also help combat stat fatigue, which will hopefully result in more accurate information, even if there is less of it.

Women's Shelter Fundraiser

We connected with the Camrose Women's Shelter to set up the annual holiday fundraiser. Camrose Public Library set up a Christmas tree, and it was decorated with ornaments that listed items the shelter was in deep need of. This was a very successful fundraiser, and in the few weeks that the tree was up, we received many gifts from the community.

New Reservation System

Due to high public demand, we have created a new reservation system for our snowshoes, walking poles and big games, with more items to be added as needed. With our old system, our Library of Things functioned the same as any other item in our collection, where someone could put a hold on the item, but could not guarantee what day it would become available. Our new system allows for our items to be reserved for specific dates, which makes it possible for patrons to book our large games and snowshoes for events, and to guarantee that they will have enough pairs at the same time.

The Intersectoral Action Fund

The Public Health Agency of Canada expects to communicate funding decisions regarding the Intersectoral Action Fund in January of 2022.

Volunteer Program

As COVID had shut down our volunteer program, we were given an opportunity to make some changes to our system before starting it back up again. To do so, we sought out some advice from the Volunteer Coordinator from the Canterbury Foundation. Feena, Nicole, Savannah and I were able to sit down with Ardythe Harder to discuss what components our volunteer program was lacking, and to help us restructure. We were able to ask questions about the administrative side of a program, using software, recruitment and appreciation efforts and more. Since then, Feena has put in a massive amount of work and has got our Volunteer Program back online.



We now have:

- A detailed Job Descriptions for all volunteer positions
- A Volunteer Handbook, which gives basic information about the library, job descriptions, specific policies that relate to volunteers, and safety information.
- A Volunteer Agreement, which acts as a loose contract and states the responsibilities of both the volunteer and CPL
- OHS information for volunteers

We have started to bring back most of the volunteers we had from pre-COVID times. Currently we have 13 volunteers, and we are so pleased to have them back. At the moment, our volunteers are primarily focused on helping us to maintain the collection through cleaning, shelf reading, and other maintenance. We are also thrilled to say that we are working with CentraCam again, and we currently have 7 wonderful volunteers through this partnership.

A few words from Feena:

"I can see a huge difference with the Volunteers here. Not only is the library cleaner, they also complete a well-rounded team."

We look forward to expanding our program in 2022.

In Person Programming

We had intended to begin running more in-person programming starting in January of 2022, but by the last week of December 2021 Omicron cases were rapidly rising. We have postponed in-person programming until the first week of February, at which point we will revaluate. As a bright point of news, the Public Library Service Branch gave use an update on December 22, stating that education adult in-person programming is now permitted.

" News on Health Restrictions

Libraries remain out of scope for REP as per CMOH Order 44-2021 and must therefore adhere to physical distancing, masking and the 1/3 capacity limit. This is because library services are considered essential to daily living.

However, Health has communicated that adult educational activities (solo or group) may occur during normal operating hours with these restrictions in place. This means **indoor adult programming is now allowed if it is educational** (which includes most of the programming libraries offer).

Libraries are permitted to partner with in-scope facilities to provide adult recreational programming in settings outside the library during and after normal operating hours if there is no risk of impact to normal service delivery."

- **Dinovember for December**: 18 people joined me for a teen-focused program where we made tree ornaments out of plastic dinosaurs
- **Penguin Party**: 18 school-aged kids joined me for a penguin-themed virtual story and craft session
- **Book & Cook (Teen Edition)**: 30 people joined me and Jolene from the Family Resource Centre for three virtual sessions; we read excerpts from YA books set in pizza parlours and cooked pizzaroni and cheese, I book-talked some manga and we made fancy ramen, and we read How the Grinch Stole Christmas and cooked my family recipe for Who Hash.
- **CSL Podcasts:** Four Augustana students created a series of environmental themed podcasts for their fall placement. You can find them with our other podcasts at https://feeds.buzzsprout.com/1793880.rss

New Programs:

- Anime Club: Savannah began hosting weekly in-person Anime Club meetings for teens 12-17
 years old at the end of November. We have paused this and other in-person meetings for
 January because of the rise of Omicron cases.
- **Backlist Book Club:** Savannah began a monthly evening adult book club in November using older titles in the collection to make sure book availability wasn't and issue and to get older titles circulating.

Take and Make:

- **DIY Dino Kits:** I made an original 50 paper bags full of biodegradable packing peanuts that stick together with water and instruction sheets for constructing dinosaurs; they were gone in days so I ended up making 112 kits in total!
- **Yarn Toques:** I made 50 kits with existing resources and instruction sheets for creating colourful toque ornaments with yarn and bathroom tissue tubes.

Contests and Passive Programs:

- **Find Fergus:** We had 29 entries, so probably double or triple the amount of people participating, as it was mainly families who were engaging in the hunt for the hidden dinosaur. We awarded a prize of a one-year membership to the Royal Tyrrell Museum.
