- 2. Board Feedback
 - a. Annual Director Evaluation: Renee has emailed board members a form to complete and submit by November 30; completion is optional.
 - b. Alberta Library Trustees Association (ALTA) Symposium: Jade attended the Symposium on November 10. The morning featured presentations on board governance and the role of library boards; attendees participated in round table discussions in the afternoon. Jade's report inspired a board discussion comparing ALTA, Parkland Regional, and the Public Library Services Branch (PLSB) of the Ministry of Municipal Affairs.
 - PLSB provides provincial funding, oversees legislative requirements, receives reports, and operates the Supernet.
 - Parkland Regional assists library staff with operational needs, provides library consultants, operates the regional library catalogue, and offers some professional development to boards and staff.
 - ALTA primarily focuses on the needs of library boards, with a focus on training and professional development, especially for new trustees.

Alyssa noted that CPL board members belong to ALTA and encouraged us to explore the ALTA website, using the log-in information emailed earlier. Alyssa further noted that she will re-send the log-in information.

3. Consent Agenda

a. Approval of Minutes of October 18, 2023 meeting.

Motion 41/23 M/S/C –Margaret Holliston/Joy-Anne Murphy: That the minutes of June 21, 2023, be approved as amended with the correct date (October 18, 2023).

- b. Items for Information:
 - i. Correspondence: Alyssa reported receiving a City Council letter confirming the appointments of Joy-Anne Murphy as our representative for the upcoming year, and having read in a public document that Don Simpson will be returning as our County representative for the upcoming year.
- c. Reports: Board members reported as having read prior to the meeting.

4. Items for Discussion

- a. Treasurer's Report: No report.
- b. Policy Committee Report: The committee met to develop three policies for board approval.
 - Discussion regarding Records Management and Confidentiality concerned requests to access a patron's reading history (borrowing records). Confidentiality helps secure a patron's privacy, autonomy, and well-being, with reading history being a key element of this.
 Borrowing records are not normally retained, though some patrons may request that the library do so.
 - Appointment and Dismissal of Board Members policy is still being explored, notably with respect to Camrose City Council's by-law regarding committee appointments (see October CPL board meeting). Alyssa discussed this issue with several other Directors at the Stronger Together conference last week. CPL board members support requesting a consultative relationship with City Council regarding appointments to the CPL board.

Motion 42/23 M/S/C – Naomi Finseth/Margaret Holliston: That Alyssa draft a letter to Camrose Administration inquiring about greater Camrose Public Library board involvement with respect to community appointments to the CPL Board, and that Alyssa and Renee both sign the letter.

c. New copier: Alyssa reported challenges related to the aging copier, including an increasing need for maintenance. Discussion centred on leasing vs purchasing; consensus that a cost of \$15,000 or thereabouts is reasonable. Leasing involves per-page printing payments and the monthly fee but covers maintenance and does not require a full payment up front.

Action: Alyssa will further explore both options, with particular attention on leasing, and report back to the board at the December meeting.

d. 2025-2029 Plan of Service: Alyssa discussed Plan of Service development with other librarians at the Stronger Together conference. Key advice:

- Planning is a board responsibility, though staff have input and assist in an administrative capacity.
- Best to contract a consultant; costs can range from \$5,000 to \$20,000 the greater the budget, the less work left to staff and volunteers.
- CPL is advised to strike an ad hoc board committee to contract and hire a consultant, and oversea the development process.
- e. Summary of the "Overdue Report" (see October meeting): Alyssa prepared a three-page summary of the multi-page report, which was included in the board package. The summary and the longer report will be helpful with respect to marketing and the 2025-2029 Plan of Service development process (also see October minutes regarding the full report, and a proposed Open House in 2024).

You wouldn't expect to find an overdose response and prevention team at a library. But Edmonton's flagship library is going next level to take care of some of its most vulnerable citizens. They also have a team of social workers and other programs. They're meeting people where they're at, and it's making a difference.

Tabatha Plesuk spends her day responding to mental health crises and opioid poisonings, but the nurse isn't based at a hospital or safe-consumption site.

Instead, she works at the Stanley Milner Library, the only branch in downtown Edmonton, which has seen a rising number of overdoses in recent years. Plesuk, who works with Edmonton Public Libraries (EPL) as part of a pilot program under the city's Downtown Vibrancy Strategy, is equipped with naloxone and works alongside outreach worker Blake Loathes.

"We see, like, everyone and anyone," Plesuk, an overdose prevention and response nurse for Boyle Street Community Services, which supports homeless people in Edmonton, told *White Coat, Black Art.*

"We see youth — we've had like people as young as 14 years of age to somebody ... who's been houseless for 14 years." While the library isn't designated as a space for people to consume drugs, staff are equipped and trained to respond to overdoses. Plesuk also provides basic health support, like wound care, to people who are facing homelessness.

She began working as a nurse at the library in August 2022. The pilot was developed, in part, to respond to an increase in security incidents and opioid poisonings around the library.

Tabatha Plesuk is a nurse based at the Stanley Milner Library in Edmonton. She provides health support and clean supplies to vulnerable people in and around the branch.

Libraries are responding more frequently to the needs of a broad population because they're known to be a welcoming space. Branches across the country — including in <u>Halifax</u> and <u>Calgary</u> — have brought in support staff and <u>social workers</u> to supplement their standard offerings of books and movies.

"They've become, especially in core areas, sort of the last place people can go to get warm or to use a washroom or to sleep or to feel safe or to get on the net," said Siobhan Stevenson, a University of Toronto professor who researches the expanding role of public libraries.

"They've become a real Mecca for that."

Libraries taking on more responsibilities

Plesuk and Loathes do two rounds of the library and surrounding area, seeing between 40 and 60 people each day.

Her backpack is filled with medical and safer sex supplies, clean tools for using drugs — like needles and pipes — and importantly, snacks. Many of the items are donated, but Plesuk buys some with her own money keeping it within \$100 a month.

EPL first brought in social workers in 2011 as more people sought refuge at the downtown branch.

Libraries can offer access to support services in a way that may be stigmatized elsewhere, says Sharon Day, EPL's executive director of customer experience.

"We connect our community to the services and those resources and everything that they need to really live a fully functioning, vibrant, exciting life."

But as the library welcomes all clients, Day says it needs to ensure it remains safe for all.

Many overdoses at Stanley Milner Library were occurring in washrooms. The library now employs attendants, and security patrols the main library and parkade, to ensure drugs aren't being used on site.

Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, the number of people identifying as homeless in Edmonton has doubled. According to EPL statistics, there were 99 overdoses across the system in 2022, with 70 per cent occurring at the Stanley Milner Library. Meanwhile, the library system reported nearly 3,000 security incidents as of Nov. 12, up from just over 2,600 last year.

"There are lots of things that draw people to a library," said Plesuk. "If you are experiencing precarity of housing or if you use substances in general ... the places that you are allowed to go use them are less and less all the time, and so people just end up here."

That shift brings tension, however. Librarians want to serve the public, Stevenson says, but as clientele with more complex needs come into libraries, there are questions about how to best help them.

The message she's heard from many librarians during her research is: "'I didn't go in to be a social worker. If I wanted to be a social worker, that's what I'd have studied.'"

Stevenson says the increase in services provided by libraries is symptomatic of cuts to social services. Libraries are bearing the brunt while funding to their core services isn't increasing, she added.

"The needs by these populations, people who didn't used to necessarily use the library, it's just skyrocketed, especially since the pandemic," said Stevenson. "Libraries can be an important part of the solution, but they just require funding."

Situation improving 'substantially'

Plesuk acknowledges that the library isn't the "best or most optimal" place for people to get support for substance use, but it offers two things: warmth and internet.

Being able to get online — especially for those without a phone — is essential to access applications required for certain services.

"My dad was houseless for a long time and passed away of an opiate poisoning," Plesuk said.

"We had long conversations about how much better he did when he had access to a cellphone. Social isolation is really hard for people. It's hard to attend appointments and things like that."

In addition to various shelters, 11 municipal sites were chosen in November for encampments. Each site will have a designated tent capacity monitored by city staff.

Coupled with Plesuk's on-site support, Day says the situation has improved "substantially," and staff are making fewer emergency calls.

As of Nov. 19, there have been 29 overdoses at the branch, and 56 in the system overall this year.

"It's like a symbiotic relationship," said Day, pointing to the various points that clients can access services.

"We have people ... potentially going to the desk, be able to get support here. We have security, maybe providing them with support through the nurse or maybe somebody from our outreach team."

The pilot project between Boyle Street Community Service and EPL is set to conclude at the end of December.

In a statement, the City of Edmonton says it's looking at funding to "extend the important services that the overdose prevention and response team provides across our downtown communities," including long-term support from the provincial and federal governments.

Despite the difficult nature of the work, Plesuk says it's gratifying to be able to support the community.

"People are so kind, even though they are experiencing some things that I could never handle," she said.

"And we just get to see community care every day."

Stronger Together

Most of our team was able to attend the in-person Stronger Together conference, and it was a wonderful day. We listened to presentations about the roles of public libraries, effective leadership, how to run a Library of Things, a case study on offering Reading with a Drag Queen, and we were able to connect with many new friends and colleagues to share ideas. It was an amazing experience, and many of my staff approached me afterward with ideas of things we need to do or change.

Homelessness Roundtable

A group of library Directors and Managers from across the province sat down (virtually) to discuss how to best navigate serving populations experiencing the worst effects of homelessness. It was simultaneously affirming and discouraging, as CPL is already doing most of the ideas that were discussed. A few new takeaways regarded our soon to be single stall restrooms. It was suggested that we install smoke detectors in cages to discourage smoking, and that we keep the keys to the bathrooms at the desk, and have patrons come and ask for the keys to help us keep a better eye on the space. Additionally, it was recommended that we come up with a procedure for discovering an unknown substance/inhalant, and that we create a procedure for sleeping patrons that our staff feel safe with. The group who gathered intend to do so semi-regularly to help support each other in supporting this vulnerable community.

Winter Holiday Party

We held our winter holiday party the first Saturday of December, which is a longstanding tradition at CPL. Our numbers have begun to climb again, and we saw many families come to eat delicious treats, make some fun crafts, get their family photos taken and listen to the dulcet tones of the Ukulele group.

Fellowship of the Camrose Public Library

Unfortunately membership in the Fellowship of the Camrose Public Library has fallen to just two members, and they are ready to move on from being the executive. They have graciously agreed to keep the group legally compliant for now, and to help orient a new executive, but they are in desperate need of new members. We will be assisting them in a membership drive in January, and if any of you know of any individuals who would be interested, please have them



reach out and we will get them connected. If the Fellowship dissolves, it is exceedingly difficult to re-start, stops the group from being able to able for Casino shifts for years, and we lose a valuable source of funding.

Elevator

The Elevator in the library decided to freeze two feet off the ground with the doors open this week. A volunteer was in the elevator and decided to try and get out themselves. They hurt their leg and had to be taken by ambulance to the hospital. The elevator is currently out of order, and we are awaiting more information from the City and Otis.


November Program Summary


Statistics Week

Milestone

We have now been conducting stats weeks three times a year for two whole years, which means we can start to make year over year comparisons! Some of these statistics are used to calculate our numbers for the Annual PLSB Survey, but some of these statistics are used to help us most effectively staff the building, plan our opening hours, choose our professional development topics and more.

Highlights




Our most commonly asked about topic is still circulation, and we had 397 interactions this week. Circulation questions refers to patrons checking out items, renewing items, paying for a lost book, questions about holds pickup, etc.

Following closely behind, like always, are our community building conversations; this time we clocked in at 371.


Community building refers to non-library conversations with patrons beyond the standard "Hi how are you" and includes things like:

- Talking to a kid about their day at school
- Chatting with a patron about their grandchildren
- Listening to a patron discuss their problems getting in contact with a government agency
- Talking with a patron about favourite places to walk in the city

Circulation questions are almost always the most common, but those numbers are starting to drop, hopefully due to the self-checkout. Community building conversations almost always come in second. We get more questions in the summer months, possibly due to the increased staff from the Book Bike and Summer Reading Program. Questions about Library Services usually come in third, and these are questions about people's accounts, programming, outreach and other questions about what the library needs and offers.



Our community's favourite way to ask questions is inperson. During the tail-end of the pandemic, online was a very close second, but since July 2022 the public overwhelmingly prefers to come visit.




This week the favourite time of day to come and ask us questions at the desk was from 11:00-12:00, and then again from 3:00-4:00. Year over year, the whole day is pretty busy when it comes to questions, but they usually drop off during the evening 5:00pm.

As for library visits in general, we saw a rapid rise in the number of visitors in 2022. While that growth is still continuing, the rate has

slowed. We saw a small increase in the number of visitors in November 2023, possibly due to our October membership drive.

People have the most to say from 10-12, and from 3-5.



This week our busiest day by a landslide was Monday, and the busiest hours over the whole week were from 2:00-4:00pm.

Over the years though, it is difficult to say what part of the day is going to be the busiest as it tends to jump around. That said, it has never during the evening hours. After making the decision to close earlier in the evenings for 2023, our

6:00-7:00 hour mark more than doubled, putting them more in line with the rest of our hours.

Computers

One surprising find is that our computer usage is (more or less) pretty stable since we started collecting stats. I expected our computer usage to increase since March 2022 due to the state of the economy and the price of home internet and cell phone plans. However, most of our metrics are relatively stable. The number of computer sessions has increased slightly, and the amount of time that people spend on the computers has not increased at all.

Our wifi sessions had a big jump in July, but they are back to normal levels now, and the amount of time people are using the wifi for has only increased marginally.
