PRL BOARD TALK

Highlights of the Parkland Regional Library Board Meeting FEBRUARY 21, 2019

Staff Long Service Awards

Three PRL staff received long service awards at the February board meeting.

Parkland Regional Library Annual Report

Ron Sheppard presented the 2018 annual report data. Items ordered through Parkland were up by 6%. Circulation overall throughout the region was up by 3% with eContent circulation increasing by a hefty 18%. Interlibrary loans continued to rise with a 14% increase in the amount of materials moving around the region. This includes material being delivered by mail, government courier, and PRL's van delivery system. The number of library card holders rose by 2% to almost 45,000 and use of library websites or, total virtual visits, increased by 8%. A more detailed annual report will be forthcoming.

Executive Committee Seats

At the November 8, 2018 organizational meeting, two of Parkland's electoral constituencies were left vacant. These were area #2 and #10. Robyn Gray, the board member representing the City of Camrose, and Megan Hanson, representing the Town of Sylvan Lake came forward to volunteer to be on the Executive Committee after the November 8, 2018 board meeting, and were appointed by the board in February.

PRL Strategic Plan

At the November 2018 board meeting, the board supported the idea that the goals from the 2016-2018 strategic plan were still valid and should be used as the basis for a new 2019-2021 strategic plan. Staff were tasked to work with the Executive Committee to review the objectives of the current strategic plan to determine whether new objectives were necessary, any old objectives were no longer relevant, or if any objectives needed to be modified.

The new Strategic Plan is a continuation of what Parkland has been doing for the last three years. The four goals are the same, with slightly different wording than the 2016-2018 Strategic Plan. The Objectives have been re-written to reflect the anticipated outcomes desired over the next three years.

PRL also has a new mission statement. The new mission statement was developed by Parkland's Executive Committee members during a facilitated session at their January 24th meeting.

The Strategic Plan is an extremely important document as it drives all the work that Parkland does, and is linked directly to PRL's budgetary requirements.

PRL Advocacy Committee

Advocacy has been identified as a very important part of Parkland and the work that we do.

At the November board meeting, the board mandated that an Advocacy Committee be created and terms of reference developed. PRL's Executive Committee was assigned the task of developing terms of reference for presentation at the February 21st board meeting.

The terms of reference were approved at the February board meeting and a committee was appointed. Eight board members volunteered. The new Parkland Advocacy Committee members are Deb Smith, Steven Levy, Norma Penney, Barb Gilliat, Jeannie Fisher, Gord Lawlor, Jeanine Stannard and Cora Knutson. Thank-you for volunteering for this very important work.

Building Update

The board can now sell the building. Notice of the discharge of the caveat preventing the sale of the building arrived on the afternoon of December 21, 2018.

Parkland staff met with Tricon Development Inc. on January 23, 2019 to discuss next steps.

The plan is to have the new headquarters building ready for occupancy in the summer of 2020.

Policy and Bylaw Updates

2018 was a year of significant change for Parkland due to retirements and organizational restructuring. As a result, Parkland has made some editorial changes to our governance policies and bylaws. The policies affected were the *Finance Policy*, *Information and Document Management Policy*, *the Role of the Executive Committee Policy*, and the schedules related to board member reimbursement and FOIP Legislation. The bylaw affected was 5.5: *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Bylaw*.

Community News from Trustees

Didsbury Municipal Library Inez, the manager of the Didsbury library retired and Monique Fiedler has taken her place.

Olds & District Municipal Library Olds is celebrating their 60th anniversary on June 6, 2019. Staff are trying to get some of the original staff members to attend.

Stettler Public Library Stettler had started a pilot project to deliver books to the Hutterite children. It has been so successful that it is now a regular outreach of the library. They have even been nominated for the Minister's Award for Excellence in Public Library Service for this work!

They also hosted a wine tasting event with a wine connoisseur and were able to raise \$2,600 for the library.

Stettler hosted a Raymond Cook Public event related to his trial, where they sold DVD's. The event exploded and they ended up having 400+ attendees and sold 147 DVD's. It was a wildly successful event.

Lastly, the County and Town of Stettler increased the library's funding by 3%.

Eckville Municipal Library Eckville Library received new (to them) shelving from Ponoka Jubilee Library and they are very grateful for Ponoka's generosity. Their library looks great!

Sylvan Lake Municipal Library

Sylvan has a new program bringing in animals for animal therapy. It is quite effective for bringing in new clientele that normally wouldn't come to the library.

Amisk Public Library

Amisk Library recently partnered with the RCMP and TransCanada for a butterfly release event. 185 people attended and the library received money towards solar panels.

Robyn Gray's Symposium Summary

While I missed most of the first day of the Shifting Services for Inclusivity Symposium (since I was at a Parkland Board Meeting), I had a fantastic time for what I was able to attend. I enjoyed informative sessions, caught up with good librarian friends, and made a few new connections.

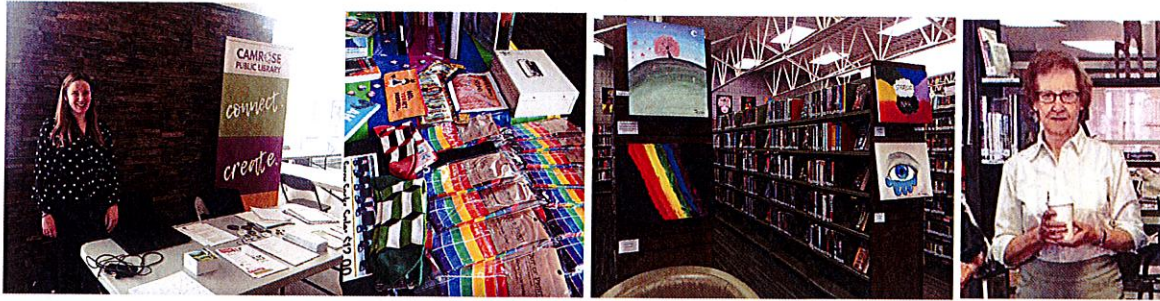
I was able to attend two sessions on the Thursday: "Duty to Accommodate and the Public Library" by Sushila Samy, and the Conversation Café as the wrap-up at the end of the day. Samy's session focused on the *Alberta Human Rights Act* and how all people are equal in dignity, rights, and responsibilities, regardless of factors such as age, race, disability marital status, and sexual orientation. She talked about accommodating the workplace environment and standards to everyone's needs, so that no one within the workplace experiences a negative effect. For the Conversation Café, I took part in the conversation on "Diversifying Board and Staff" which was led by Colette Poitras, and the conversation focused largely on ensuring that staff and board members should always feel confident in contributing their voice and perspective at meetings and within the workplace.

I thoroughly enjoyed Friday's Symposium sessions. We started off the day with a video called "The Danger of a Single Story" by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie, which explored how it can be harmful when we are only exposed to one person's perspective, instead of listening to other people's views. The speaker of this session is from Nigeria, so she talked about how people from the USA have a very different view of her from what her own experience growing up was like, since they only know a single 'story' of Nigeria. Our next session was a Panel Discussion called "Being an Ally" by Danielle Allard, Anne Carr-Wiggin, and Sarah Howdle, and focused on the perspective of three people who are not Indigenous themselves, but have become allies and committed their work to fostering partnerships and research with Indigenous peoples.

The next session was called "When 'Monsters' Call: Facing Public Challenges to Library Programs, Ideas, and Directions" and it was delivered by Deb Cryderman. She discussed different challenges to library programs and collections, and addressed documents such as the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms and how challenges factor into these documents. The next session was "What's Next?: Assessing Community Needs" by Jordan DeSousa from Public Library Services Branch, and he related the concepts of inclusivity and diversity to library services, and how that affects future Plans of Service.

The lightning rounds included a talk by none other than Nicole Bannick, called "Bunk to Bunker: Making Space for Inclusive Community". She did a fantastic job of describing how the Bunker came to be! There were about 5 additional lightning talks, and they were diverse and equally informative.

This was a great symposium! The sessions provided me with ideas in terms of our collection development (such as integrating Indigenous works with our collection while also having Indigenous displays, and ensuring we have enough large print items on our shelves), and also gave me several ideas for how to make our space user-friendly to everyone – some of these ideas could be implemented in our current space, but a majority of them were ones that I would love to integrate when we design and build a new building. I am very grateful that I was able to attend!

Pride Week at Augustana

We happily took part in Augustana’s Pride week again this year by providing them with a book cart filled with books with LGBTQ+ characters, and also selling library-card rainbow socks on behalf of the Fellowship of Camrose Public Library. We sold lots of socks over the course of Pride week! I attended the raising of the Pride flag at the Camrose Visitor Information Centre on February 25 – it was a short ceremony thanks to the -30 degree weather, but it was great to be there and then to see the flag wave all week!

News and More:

- **I attended the Public Library Services Branch Symposium entitled Shifting Services for Inclusivity** on February 21 and 22. I am providing a brief summary, but please feel free to email me or pop in to borrow the resource thumb drive if you have any questions!

The keynote speaker for Thursday was Jesse Lipscombe, an Edmonton actor, producer, and activist who started the #MakeItAwkward movement to combat racism, misogyny, homophobia, and hatred of all kinds. Jesse spoke about how the #MakeItAwkward campaign began, the mainOur first day brought sessions on unconscious bias, core values of librarianship, attitudinal barriers to service for print-disabled patrons, accessibility for people with disabilities, developing inclusive collections, info on NNELS, and libraries' duty under the Alberta Human Rights Act to provide accessibility accommodations patrons who need to us library to services and spaces.

Friday sessions began with a video by Nigerian writer Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie in her TED Talk entitled The Danger of a Single Story. This was followed by a panel discussion about being an ally to Indigenous communities, a presentation by our former Director (Deb spoke about facing challenges to library services, material, and programs), community needs assessments, and some lightning rounds on a variety of topics in which I spoke about how we created the Bunker and the importance of inclusive space in libraries. Our closing keynote speaker was Dr. Toni Samek, Professor and Chair at the School of Library and Information Studies at the U of A. Dr. Samek gave an inspiring talk about library workers' and library boards' responsibility to provide services that maintain the balance between inclusion and freedom of speech.
